RECTOR'S RAMBLE



Many of us have seen what AI can do with image creation. I was curious and gave it a few tries. Then one of my boys asked me to ask ChatGPT to: 'draw a caveman making friends with an iguanodon using a taco'. It gave me the picture below. I have multiple reactions to this. Firstly — said son was delighted: this was exactly the kind of picture he was hoping for.

Secondly there is wonder: how on earth does it do this? The level of complexity to get a computer to do this kind of art is extraordinary: the AI not only understood what a caveman, an iguanodon and a taco looked like, but it composed the image and understood the tone of the request. There is a cartoonish vibe to the request, but how did it understand?

Further reflection is more troublesome. ChatGPT gets its answers by chewing through the internet to borrow and adapt the things it finds. A Google search for the same request does not find a similar picture, but have I inadvertently infringed someone's copyright? How would we know? And secondly, AI is hugely energy and resource hungry. One study I found said that the creation of one image (like that above) uses the same amount of energy as fully charging your smartphone. That may not sound a lot to you, but when we all make AI images of cavemen, or ourselves as an action figure, the numbers add up, and they all translate into carbon in the atmosphere.

The trouble I see is that AI, and other computer intensive activities like streaming films, are making work in a computer we don't see, and we don't get a sense of how much heat they are producing, or how much energy consuming. Should



these platforms inform us of their energy usage in joules per hour or kilos of CO₂ per hour? How conscious are we of the cost of our digital consumption? Is this picture another step towards our own extinction (like that of the iguanodon and the Neanderthal)?

THEOLOGY CORNER



Judgement and Life after Death

Last month we looked at hell — where Christian ideas of hell come from, what they are, and what they may not be. Now let's look at judgement and the end of all things. Judgement has a tendency to strike fear at our hearts. We can get on fine at work, but an annual performance review can strike fear at our hearts. The thought of God's judgement can make the most pious Christian nervous, too. And when John the Baptist warns that the one to come (Jesus) will have his winnowing fork in his hand, and will separate the wheat from the chaff (which he will burn with unquenchable

fire), it all sounds a bit... judgemental! But we shouldn't worry so much! The whole point of Christianity is that Jesus Christ has won the victory over sin and death and demonstrated our atonement with God, our forgiveness for our faults. And as for the wheat and the chaff? Every grain of wheat has chaff. The wheat is threshed to separate grain and chaff, and then winnowed. Surely this means that you are a grain of wheat, while your tendency to mess up, to sin, is your chaff. In judgement God separates you from your sin, which is thrown away, while the wholesome part of you is kept. This is actually a good thing! Threshed and winnowed grain is useful! Judgement is useful. There are other phrases of judgement in the Bible, of course, such as separating the sheep from the goats (Matthew 25). Here we have the sense of a separation, but despite our assumptions, that phrase gives us very little, except that sheep and goats in those times looked very similar. Happily, in that same passage, Jesus goes on: "Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me? The righteous (and unrighteous!) then deny they ever saw this, but he replies that 'whatever you did for the least of these brothers and sisters of mine you did for me'. Compassion for the needy is a key point of judgement! What is harder is that most of us are a mix of good and bad, generosity and selfishness, compassion and thoughtlessness. This is where I find the wheat and the chaff useful. I'd love to spend eternity in heaven — but only the worthy part of me deserves to go. I cannot spend eternity with God unchanged.

But do we really mean *heaven*? Well, not really! Read Revelation carefully and we'll find the promise of a 'new heaven and a new earth'. The old ones aren't scrapped, but *renewed*. Heaven is God's throne room, earth is where we live. So we're not, apparently,

going to get wings nor strum harps on clouds. We're invited to live in a renewed earth, in which there is no more pain, nor tears, no inequality, no jealousy, no problems. I recognise there are enormous problems imagining all this. The literalist in me wants to ask about population density in the new earth, and where we'll all live if everyone from all history is here and if we'll see dodos. And the best answer to any of this is 'Don't be so literal!'

'In my Father's house there are many rooms,' says Jesus in John 14. Suddenly I'm picturing a great mansion. But that is too literal. Revelation describes the 'New Jerusalem' with streets paved with gold and a river running through it, and the tree of life bearing multiple different kinds of fruit, and its leaves are for the healing of the nation. This is a beautiful image of harmony. But it is just an image fighting with the limits of language to describe the infinitely wonderful that is eternity under God's loving rule. The Bible starts in a garden and ends in a garden city — a world in which we have chosen to live in harmony with each other and nature, under God's good rule. In the end all of this, all of faith, is less about *God's* judgement of *us*, than *our* judgement of *God*. When we have thought through creation and justice, sin, atonement, life and death have we decided that God is real? And is God a God you want to be with? And do you agree that the way Jesus asks you to live your life is the best way? And do you think his way will really win out over all other ways? If so, come to church, say your prayers, do the good that you can.

DARSHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The **Annual Parish Meeting** was held on 13th May and was well attended. Various village organisations displayed the activities available in Darsham. Wine and canapés were served. Grateful thanks to Budgens for donating the wine.

The Chair presented her report, as did County Councillor Richard Smith. This was followed by reports from each councillor on their portfolios.

The minutes of the APM will be placed on the Darsham website.

This was followed by the Parish Council AGM

Cllr Jasmine Backhouse was re-elected as Chairman and Cllr Diane Taylor was re-elected as Vice Chair.

Cllr Holmes reported that 6200 cars entered the village from A12 along The Street in the first two weeks of April. The following two weeks in April 14,878 cars passed the the speed indicator. All the data is being collected with the intention of passing this on to Sizewell to support funding for a 20mph limit through the village. It was also agreed to apply for permission for a pole and a new speed indicator to slow down and monitor the traffic leaving the village from The Street towards the A12.

The PC has adopted the red phone box on Coronation Square. Cllr Oliver will be drawing up plans for its refurbishment so it can be used as a book and DVD exchange as well as a seasonal seed exchange.

Planning application for the grain store and stables at Green Farm was approved as well as for the erection of a shed adjacent to the Village Hall.

The Chair also wants to publicly thank all the councillors for voluntarily giving up their time to support the PC. The next PC meeting will be held on Tuesday 10th June at 7pm in the Village Hall. *Jasmine Backhouse*

MIDDLETON WI

At our April meeting we welcomed David Naylor, a volunteer from RSPB Minsmere and a keen bird watcher and amateur photographer. Over the years he has carried out bird surveys, observed weather

effects on the reserve and monitored the animals and reptiles living there. Minsmere has distinct areas of habitat which sustain a wide diversity of wildlife. The reedbeds are home to bitterns, bearded tits, great crested grebes, water voles and otters. Lowland heath, woodland and grassland support nightjars, nightingales, stone curlews, dartford warblers, red deer, badgers, muntjacs, red fox and stoats. Soaring above Minsmere can now be seen the marsh harrier which has reappeared after the use of DDT was banned. In the spring and autumn there are migrating birds on their way to and from Africa. In the near future, David told us, there is a good chance that the osprey and the white-tailed sea eagle will become residents in our reserve. Rita thanked David for his very interesting talk and his stunning photos with which he illustrates his talks, one of which had been chosen for The Countryfile Calendar!

Our June meeting will be on the 18th at 7:15pm. Our speaker will be Mark Mitchels and his view of "The Suffolk Coastline". Everyone is welcome to join us.

PEASENHALL AND SIBTON

Swift Group

We have formed a swift group in Peasenhall and Sibton to try and support these wonderful birds in their attempts to breed locally. Numbers have been dwindling in recent years but we were told by Save Our Suffolk Swifts (SOSS) that the colony on the front of the Assembly Hall is likely to be the second largest in Suffolk. The Hall trustees agreed to have extra nest boxes built at the front and back of the hall while it was being refurbished, outside the swifts' breeding, for the the colony to expand into.

The group intends to survey where swifts are breeding in the two villages and encourage owners to install more swift nest boxes at suitable elevated locations. We will also be attempting to monitor numbers of birds and, hopefully identify any increases in population. If you think you have swifts nesting in your roof or nearby we'd be pleased to know.

These summer visitors – here for just four months from May to August – thrill us with low-level acrobatics and gyroscopic flights as they scream around the skies, prospecting for potential nest sites. They feed, sleep and even mate on the wing, landing only to fashion a minimal nest cup and breed. They are commonly nesting in pan-tiled roofs of older buildings, if nest boxes aren't available. Our first swift was spotted by the Assembly Hall on 28th April, brought in early by the warm weather. We have purchased a flag to show that swifts have arrived, which is now flying outside Sibton Nursery, with kind permission of Mr Levett-Scrivener and the help of Manager Tess.

PROJECT UPDATE

JUNE 2025

Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

Preparation for the Friday Street Roundabout is progressing well. The works compound has been established and the vegetation and tree clearance along the A12 is almost complete. Site preparation along the route of the two-village bypass is also ongoing for the archaeology phase.

Yoxford Roundabout is also being prepared for construction. BT Openreach will be diverting cables along the A12 from May to June which will require traffic management with traffic signals.

For the Sizewell Link Road, a works compound has been established at the western end of the Sizewell Link Road beside the A12, with archaeological works ongoing. The Park and Ride site preparation continues, with construction due to begin this summer. Railway track improvements along the Leiston branch continue at pace, we expect the first trains bringing in materials to site this summer.

The Freight Management Facility (FMF) at the Orwell Logistics Park, which located off the A14 is now operational. The FMF is a vital part of how we manage our lorries and goods travelling to Sizewell. The FMF site will be for HGVs to check-in before proceeding along the A12 to site.

We are installing average speed cameras along the B1122 and the B1125 from the end of May 2025 to further enhance road safety along this route. We are also upgrading the temporary Sizewell C signs across the county along the A14, A12 and local roads to be permanent signs. An Abnormal Indivisible Load (AIL) layby will also be built on the A12 near the B1078 that will help to manage our wider load HGV movements that are escorted by the police to site.

From the summer we will be undertaking road improvements along the B1122, B1078, A140 / B1078 and the B1119 / A12 at Saxmundham, further details and updates will be given to communities as the works programmes are finalised.

Along the Sizewell beach, from the week commencing 19th May, we will be establishing two small compounds on the foreshore. One compound will be approx. 5mx5m, Heras fenced, and the second compound will be 20mx5m storage and welfare, and will be fenced off. There will be no impact to the public footpath along the route.

From the end of May 2025, Sizewell C will begin construction of the northern section of the temporary sea defence. We will be installing sheet piles at 7.3m height to create the temporary defence. This work will continue over the next few months. We will carry out these works Monday–Friday. The public footpath will remain open for the duration of the works. We apologise in advance for any noise disturbance caused due to these works.

Westleton Donations to Leiston Food Bank

WESTLETON PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met with Sizewell C (SZC) in April and May when SZC explained that the average speed cameras will be installed at either end of the village on the B1125 in May and will be activated in June. They also said that the entrance to the village on the Reckford Road will be moved south to be closer to the lay-by with the glass recycling bins and that the speed limit on the road to Middleton will be reduced to 50mph. The other traffic-calming measures within the village (narrowing the road around the Crown with the island by the church entrance, the double yellow lines, and the road-narrowing "build-out" by the playing field entrance) will be installed in October following official consultations for the Traffic Regulation Orders. At the same time, the road into Blythburgh by the water tower will be blocked-off – this should also deter traffic taking the shortcut to the B1122 via Westleton. Please see the Parish Council website for more information from the 7th May SCZ Northern Transport Forum.

The Planning Inspectorate (PI) has invited organisations and individuals to register as *interested parties* to allow participation in the PI Examination of the Sea Link cabling and converter station project. The Parish Council will register and recommends that residents also register as the additional traffic and construction works required for the Sea Link project will impact our area already suffering from the SZC works. The more individuals who register as interested parties to oppose the project, the harder it is for

the Planning Inspectorate to approve it. **The deadline to register is 23rd June**. You can find information and guidance, and subscribe to receive Planning Inspectorate updates at the Sea Link page on the National Planning Inspectorate website (project EN020026) and on the Energy projects page of the Parish Council website.
