As I write, *that* Oval Office meeting with Zelenskyy is still recent news, while Israel has cut off electricity and therefore running water to Gaza. This is profoundly awful and depressing. The news has become so toxic that I don't want to know what is going on in the world. What will *they* do next? There is dreadful destruction

closer to home, too, as I don't need to remind you. We are carrying around more stress and anxiety because of this sense of threat hanging over world politics, the economy, and our local environment. What can we do, at all?

I say all this despite basically being both optimistic *and* hopeful. Is there a difference? These are quite subjective definitions, but I think optimism sees things working out for me or for us, while hope can be less tangible: bigger but more distant. Hope says that *in the end it will all be ok*.

For Christians this hope arises from the events of Easter. Two thousand years ago, things were not OK either. Pontius Pilate was quite as crass and cynical as any modern leader you may think of, the Holy Land had no self-rule and no prospect of it, slavery was an unchallenged daily reality ... and human rights? What human rights! Within that environment a man called Jesus preached that God still cared, God still loved, God was on the side of the victims and the persecuted, the hungry and excluded. Not only did Jesus preach this with such power that his teaching is still followed, but reports even followed him of amazing miracles, all helping the little guy. While hunger was a daily problem, he spoke of God's abundance. He spoke directly against the abuses of power - Roman, religious, Jewish - so they had him crucified. Then, three days later, Jesus' body went missing from the tomb. His followers believed he was alive and were willing to die for that belief. Fifty days later, this extraordinary wave of hope was breaking out all over Jerusalem, and it spread across the world.

The hope Christians find in the resurrection is not a naive fairy tale. hope. It was forged in a world more bitterly unjust than our own. And it urges us to pray and act as if we *do* have a voice, and as if our actions *can* make a difference.

You are very welcome at your local church this Easter, and may your hope be stirred and invigorated by the hope of Christ. Blessings, Tim.

THEOLOGY CORNER



ESCHATOLOGY

Eschatology is the Christian study of the last things — what happens at the end of it all? It can be really interesting, but also fraught with speculation and bad theology!

As is appropriate with Easter approaching, resurrection is very important to our ideas of the end times. As discussed a few months ago, Jesus' resurrection was a vindication of Jesus against the accusations levelled against him, but it was also evidence of God's forgiving us. Resurrection was also the beginning of God undoing the powers of sin and death -'unravelling' the work of the devil, if you will. As such, Jesus'

resurrection began something: it was inaugurating the end times, but with much more to come. Like hearing the first bird song of spring, but knowing that summer is yet to come.

In the Lord's Prayer we pray 'thy kingdom come'. What do we mean by this? I think we are praying for a time when everyone will know God's love and love God in return, living life by God's code. We are closer to that than in Jesus' day — two billion people claim to be Christian — but God's kingdom must be one of universal kindness and goodness... and we're not there yet.

This month I want to just look at some of the main thinkers and movements in eschatological thinking.

Key Sources

Within the New Testament the main places we go are Mark 13, 1 Thessalonians 4, and Revelation. These speak of heaven and hell, judgement, God's kingdom, Jesus' second coming, and hope. Perhaps the most important thing is that Revelation ends with victory. God has conquered all evil, there is peace, and heaven and earth are renewed.

Biggest influencers

Along the way, though, other sources have shaped our vision significantly. The Romans believed in an afterlife (Elysium) in which we might meet our dead relatives. This has shaped Christian visions of the afterlife significantly.

Augustine of Hippo's *The City of God* contrasted God's kingdom to 'the city of this world', in which Christians are in exile. Joachim of Fiore talked of three ages: of the Father (Old Testament), of the Son (New Testament and now), and of the Spirit, in which new movements would finally bring peace on earth. Dante's Divine Comedy was hugely influential on the medieval imagination of hell, purgatory and heaven. His work was art, political satire, speculative eschatology and a novel of personal growth all rolled into one.

The reformation stripped out ideas of purgatory from protestant thinking, while the enlightenment approached everything with scepticism.

Modern theology has rediscovered the apocalyptic overtones in Jesus' speeches (not least Mark 13), and the nuances of reading Revelation in the broader context of similar prophetic writings.

Twentieth Century

Other key influencers in the twentieth century were Rudolf Bultmann, who attempted to 'demythologise' the New Testament, including its eschatology. Jürgen Moltmann, by contrast, emphasised that our hope was in Jesus Christ and thus what we believe of the future is very important — it is the driving force of our faith. Helmut Thielicke, a close contemporary (and another German!) observed that our beliefs about the future significantly shape our ethics too. One of the worrying consequences of 'dispensationalism' (see below) is a lack of concern for climate change!

All this debate and thought has led to there being three main views of the Kingdom of God held during the twentieth century.

Futurist — the Kingdom of God will all happen in the future, and will intervene disruptively in the midst of human history.

Realised — the Kingdom of God has already happened, through Jesus' incarnation, death and resurrection.

'Inaugurated Eschatology' — the Kingdom of God was 'inaugurated' through Jesus' life, death and resurrection, and has begun to influence human history, but has not yet been fully realised or fulfilled yet. I'm firmly in this camp, as you can tell by my earlier remarks.

One of the most prominent futurist views is 'dispensationalism'. This was pioneered by John Nelson Darby, but popularised through the Schofield Reference Bible which was *very* popular in the United States, and effectively made it mainstream there. This view organised history into seven periods, of which the seventh was the 'millennium'. It also popularised belief in 'the rapture', a belief (based on Mark 13 and 1 Thessalonians 4) that history would end suddenly with God taking up all the believers directly to heaven, leaving everyone else on earth. There was a series of novels called *Left Behind* which explored that idea. While embraced by the USA, the rest of the world is much cooler on it — I think it shows a horrendous failure to read the New Testament as it's meant to be read, and leads to some very alarming thinking!

Next month we'll continue by looking at heaven, hell, judgement and how this could all be a good thing.

DARSHAM PARISH COUNCIL

At the meeting held on 11th March, County Councillor Richard Smith gave his report and provided information on the rising costs for social care, care homes and residential homes. He thinks that sadly it may be necessary for some care homes to close.

Secondly, he briefly discussed the current government reform and the idea of a Suffolk/Norfolk unitary authority with the election of a mayor. He envisages lots of debate in the next six months.

As a Parish Council we agreed to pursue a planning application for a shed to store our community self-help equipment.

The lay-by outside our village church needs some attention. A highways officer, a church representative, and a member of the Parish Council plan to meet to see what can be done.

We are currently collecting data and monitoring both traffic volume and speed through the village, and completing a comparison from previous data collection.

Our next meeting will be held on April 8th in our Village Hall.
