### **Rector's Ramble**



I heard a story about schoolchildren who were doing drawings inspired by listening to the carol 'Away in a Manger'. The teacher went round the class asking about the pictures. One child clearly had the baby Jesus, and his virgin mother, and someone very big. "Who is this?" the teacher asked. "That's Round Yon," replied the child.

"Hark the Herald Angels Sing" contains this puzzling verse:

Hail the heaven-born Prince of Peace! Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Light and life to all He brings, Risen with healing in His wings.

This last line refers to a line in one of the minor prophets, Malachi: 'But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings.' This was quickly associated with expectations of a future king, a "messiah", who would be in King David's family line, and who would bring justice, judgement and salvation.

Now, there's a story in the gospels (Matt. 9:18-21) about a woman who reached out and touched the hem of Jesus' cloak while he was walking through the crowd, on the way to heal someone else. And she was instantly healed from the twelve years of bleeding and the consequent social exclusion she had suffered. How did this happen, and why?

Jewish men wore (and still wear) tassels, called *tzitzit*, on their cloaks as a special way of remembering that they are under God's law and God's covenant. Hebrew has a letters-mean-numbers scheme, and the number of threads and the number of knots and the spaces make 613, the number of commands in the Torah. The knots were on the corners of the cloak, and the Hebrew word for *corner* is the same as that for *wing*. Malachi's prophecy quickly led to expectations that the very tassels of the messiah's cloak would have healing properties. When the woman reached out to touch Jesus' cloak, she was not merely reaching out in desperate hope. She was also declaring her belief that Jesus was the special king who was to come - that he was the messiah. She was healed, and she was right!

As we celebrate Christmas this year, healing may well be on the minds of many of us. The healing of people we know and love, or perhaps of ourselves. The healing of relationships — not least in the Holy Land. The healing of all that is broken in this world. Come to a carol service, sing of the healing in His wings, and join us in praying for peace and healing and light.

I, my family and the ministry team wish you a very merry Christmas and a happy new year.

#### THEOLOGY CORNER



#### Salvation — part 1

It is odd timing to write a piece on salvation at Christmas, when the concept is more associated with Easter. But just as Christ is central to Christianity, salvation is central to Christian theology, so why not consider this at Christmas, since Jesus was born for our salvation?

Christianity recognised immediately that Jesus' crucifixion, death and resurrection were central to our salvation, and the problem of evil. The big problem, though, is how? Did the three days of Good Friday to

Easter Sunday change things for ever, or did they merely make known a truth that had stood for all time? Was it possible to be saved before the Cross, and if not, what happened to all those who lived before Jesus? How exactly do Christians claim that this is a solution to evil, when evil continues - apparently unabated? And, if Christians think this is so important, why can't they all agree on the same reason for why it is important?

Firstly, why did Jesus have to die? If you were to join the army, you would do so not because you had a death-wish, but because you believed it was important to serve and protect your country. But you do so knowing the risk that combat could be fatal. God became *incarnate* at Christmas in the person of Jesus, not because he wanted to die, nor because the Father wanted him to die, but because he wanted to save humanity from its sins. He did so not with the risk of death, but the absolute certainty of death. Was he born to die, then? No, he was born to live, to teach, to heal, and to redeem — but his death at the hands of the Roman and Jewish authorities was an inevitable consequence of his shining a light on people who were willing to use violence to mask their true nature. Jesus died because powerful people conspired to silence someone who was a nuisance to them. It just didn't turn out as they had planned.

So, how did Jesus' death change things? What did it achieve? The first consideration comes from the Old Testament. Judaism before the destruction of the temple was founded on a system of sacrifice. Did Jesus act as the ultimate sacrifice? Romans Chapter 3 and pretty much all of the book of Hebrews seem to argue this. And it makes a lot of sense: if killing an animal could be a way of apologising for sins and making right with God for an individual, perhaps the ultimate sacrifice of a perfect man might do this for all time — especially if that man died willingly. He might be the ultimate scapegoat for Yom Kippur, the day of atonement?

For me there are huge problems with this theory. It begins with significant prophetic voices of the Old Testament, such as Psalm 51 and Micah 6 protesting that God does not delight in sacrifices. Then there is the relative absurdity of it. How could the sacrifice of the Son of God somehow make recompense? Then there is the injustice and inhumanity of it. Can a just God want or require such cruel injustice to satisfy his need for a perfect sacrifice?

Jesus is frequently called the 'Lamb of God'. This is a reference, not to the day of atonement, but to Passover. This was an occasion for remembering the escape from Egypt, and how the blood of a lamb smeared on the door lintels somehow warded away the angel of death from the Israelite homes, so that they were then free to escape across the Red Sea into the desert. This implies that the crucifixion is less about atonement than warding away evil, and freedom.

An entirely different theory thinks in terms of Christ's resurrection as victory over sin, death and the devil. Gregory the Great spoke of this as 'duping the devil'. The devil believes he has a claim on all human flesh, because of sin. Christ, fully man but sinless, is the bait that the devil takes and is hooked by. He is defeated, and Christ wins. Mediaeval writing expands on this — Christ, in death, descended to hell, broke the gates, and 'harrowed' hell - freeing all its captives.

Multiple New-Testament references speak of the Son of Man giving his life as a ransom. But if a ransom is being paid, can it really be to God the Father? No. So is it to the devil? C. S. Lewis's famous story, *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* leans on this theory: the witch seems to win, but a deeper magic brings Aslan back to life in real victory over her.

But there are huge problems with 'Christ the Victor', too. Why should God give in to the devil's ransom? Isn't it underhand for God to trick the devil? That shouldn't be in God's playbook! That being said, this image recognises the costliness of victory, and that the resurrection really is a victory, giving resurrection at least equal emphasis with the crucifixion. It recognises too that things have really changed, and not because God suddenly change his mind.

There are three more major theories on the crucifixion, which we will discuss next time, in February.

#### Autumn Concert, Holy Trinity Church, Middleton – A snapshot...

Sunday 20th October saw a full-to-bursting Holy Trinity Church in Middleton enjoy a wonderful autumn concert courtesy of a piano trio comprising Middleton's own Reiko Fujisawa (piano), Matthew Denton (violin) and Emma Denton (cello). Reiko is, of course, well known to us

The church works beautifully for such events and the PCC is delighted to see it being used so extensively by – and for - the community. For instance, the following Wednesday saw a life-affirming performance by Middleton's primary school children for their Harvest Festival - as marked a musical contrast from Sunday as you can imagine(!), and an equally joy-filled occasion.

#### **MIDDLETON WI NEWS**

At our October meeting our President Rita welcomed Andy Malcolm, fundraiser for the last twenty-one years for the Fishermen's Mission, who gave us a talk on "The True Cost of Fish". The charity was founded by Ebenezer Mather in 1881 after 189 fishermen died in a storm off the coast of Eyemouth in Scotland. After WW2 there were 75,000 UK fishermen; the number is now 11,500. It is the most dangerous job in Britain with more deaths (the average age of a fisher lost is mid-30s) and accidents per number doing the job than even in farming. When an incident happens at sea the Mission is informed and is immediately ready to help the victim on arrival on shore and their family with the essentials of life. They will visit in hospital, raise money for the family, help with paperwork and bureaucracy and give moral and spiritual help. The Mission also supports retired fishermen who are maybe in poverty or ill health. Fishermen's clubs have been set up to combat loneliness, and the "Sea Fit" road-shows bring health checks, advice and dentistry to fishermen when they are on shore.

Along with some stories of fishermen who have been helped, Andy with a strong, deep voice sang a few sea shanties and even had us sing along to one! He ended his talk with the fact that 380 million portions of fish and chips are eaten every year in the UK. Fish is the only food that is still hunted! Rita thanked Andy for a most enjoyable and entertaining hour.

The December meeting on the 18th at 7.15pm is our End of Year celebration, with music from Martin and Annie of Syzewell Gap. All are welcome. *Lynne Venn*

Her walks along the Causeway always involved conversations with whoever she met. She had time for everybody, always had concern for others, was always kind in both word and thought, always wise in her opinions. She is greatly missed.

#### WESTLETON PARISH COUNCIL

**Energy projects:** some good news - following a recent consultation, National Grid has decided that its Belgium/Kent Nautilus interconnector will now landfall at the Isle of Grain instead of in Suffolk. This is the outcome that Westleton Parish Council, along with all other local councils and pressure groups, had lobbied for. National Grid has said that "Community and stakeholder feedback has been essential to the evolution of Nautilus". However, Lionlink, Sealink and the Scottish Power projects are still planned for Suffolk, and so the Friston Substation and the associated converter stations are still expected to be built near Saxmundham.

Sizewell C's (SZC) Northern Transport Forum was held on 6th November. The Forum is the opportunity for SZC to update parishes on transport developments and to answer questions. Amongst many other things:

- East Suffolk District Council (ESDC) explained that it has set up a housing fund (funded by SZC) offering grants for redecoration and renovation to allow homeowners to create bedspaces for SZC workers. The grants range from £3000-£7000; info can be found on the ESDC website.

- SZC explained that it is clearing a lot of trees at the site and for the Yoxford roundabout, the Link Road and the Darsham Park and Ride. It is all being done now as this is the only time of year that clearance is possible without significant

disturbance of wildlife. The SZC plans include significant replanting. Please go to the Westleton Website for a full report of the meeting.

**Reminder**: Orwell Housing Association (OHA) and ESDC will present their plans for the Affordable Housing Scheme in the Village Hall Foyer Monday 9th December between 3.00 and 7.00pm. This is a village consultation so do please drop in to see the plans. ESDC officers will also be present to register interest for the new homes and to explain the application process.

#### **GRANT FOR CONSERVATION ON THE COMMON**

Westleton Parish Council has received a very generous grant of £700 from the Community and Conservation Fund of Suffolk & Essex Coast & Heaths National Landscape.

This grant will meet most of cost of hiring contractors to clear a cliff on Westleton Common. In the recent past this cliff has hosted nesting sand martins but has become overgrown with gorse and other vegetation. We hope this clearance will encourage the sand martins to return.

In 2021 GeoSuffok surveyed the common and suggested that clearing this cliff would also expose some interested geological features – horizontal layers of sand and gravel. These layers can now clearly be seen.
