Next month the timetable of church services is going to look very different to normal.

For the Sundays of Lent (9th March to 13th April) I am experimenting with holding a single 'benefice' service each week (to which everyone is very welcome, naturally).

The reasons for this are:

- I believe that a series of six weeks worshipping together will help us to get to know each other better increasing our ties and our unity.
- We can showcase to each other some of what is good in worship in each church.
- Worshipping in larger numbers can be encouraging singing is louder, and the coffee and chat afterwards can have more of a buzz to it.

This is not an attempt to make my life easier by reducing the varied and creative life of eight churches down to one roaming congregation! I value too much the diversity that this benefice enjoys — from Book of Common Prayer evensongs to family@church to Taizé worship and 'normal' communion.

Furthermore, Easter Sunday services (when Easter comes) will be held in all the churches, as befits the fantastic celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus.

I warmly encourage you to join me in a sort of pilgrimage around the benefice through Lent, and use this opportunity to explore the differences that you will encounter across the six weeks. One service will be a BCP communion. Another will be family worship — but whatever your normal preference, I encourage you to come to these varied services, and be encouraged by a different (and equally wonderful) part of the wider worshipping community.

Another reason for this dramatic change in the rota for six weeks is so that we can engage in a Lent course looking at Christian Ethics together. I am inviting guest speakers to co-lead so that we can discuss some of the difficult topics — war, medical ethics, and the more everyday — 'How should we spend our money well?' These will be discussions and explorations to which all are welcome. Put it in your diary now! — Darsham Village Hall at 4pm each Sunday of Lent for an hour and half, with refreshments. *Blessings, Tim.*

INHERITANCE TAX BURDEN FOR FARMS: ALL IS NOT LOST

To everyone in the farming or rural community concerned about the effects of the recent budget changes concerning inheritance tax, I would say do not despair, you are not alone, and help is available.

Inheritance tax has long been a divisive subject and has been charged on nonbusiness estates for many decades, these estates invariably realising their monetary values by sales or encashment of investments. They are distinct from farming and business estates where the assets need to be passed on in their entirety to enable the business operation to continue, any breakup or sale of those assets reducing the value of the business and affecting the operating capability, and thus the potential for profit and employment. With the announcement by the Chancellor in last autumn's budget, businesses and farms now face risks upon the death of the owner. Within the inheritance tax rules there are various allowances and thresholds that can be applied. These are not a "one size fits all" set of rules and should be tailored to meet the needs of the individual business operation, as each enterprise is different: freehold or leasehold, arable or pasture, trees or industrial units. Set against this consideration needs to be given to debts or mortgages that be utilised.

The first essential step is the preparation of a suitable Will. This Will enables the consideration of the estate, and the effective pathway as to the distribution of the estate upon death, and as such the application of tax planning. However, with the preparation of a Will, it is possible to consider the operation of the business model used. Many people operate as sole traders or partnerships without a proper deed. The simple application of putting in place a proper partnership deed could have massive implications as to tax savings. It is also necessary to consider the incorporation into a company or the use of a Trust. There are a range of options available, and with the correct application of such tax planning methods, it can be possible to not only mitigate the tax liability, but in some cases extinguish it.

It is essential to realise that the position you may face is being faced by many others, but the solutions for each can be very different and need to be tailored to your needs and family succession requirements. It is therefore essential that you seek advice from your solicitor or accountant but ensure that they have the requisite expertise to deal with the nuisances and issues that farming and business communities face.

THEOLOGY CORNER



SALVATION — PART 2

Back in December I wrote about some of the key theories for why and how Jesus' death and resurrection are necessary for our salvation. After briefly looking at the question of why Jesus had to die, we looked at salvation in terms of sacrifice, and of 'Christ the victor'. Today we conclude with three more key ideas — legal penalty, good example, and the cross as anti-violence.

Substitutionary Atonement

If you get a parking ticket, you have to pay a penalty. The law isn't that interested in who pays the fine — you, your spouse, your rich neighbour - so long as the penalty is paid. Some, notably Anselm of Canterbury, have seen salvation in this way.

Anselm disliked the notion that the devil might have a hold on us (as in 'Christ the victor') and so developed a theory around legal penalty. All humans have fallen short of the demands of God's law, and none is able to pay the price for this rebellion, his theory goes. God's perfect justice demands that the penalty be paid. God's perfect love demands that God should save his people, and so God is made incarnate to pay the price for human sin. Jesus dies so that we might be freed. There is much that is commendable in Anselm's theory — a real sense that Jesus suffered so that we might not. The substitution of Jesus for Barabbas effected by Pontius Pilate seems to signal this.

But there are problems: if the Father implacably seeks justice and the Son seeks mercy — have we not set two persons of the Trinity at cross purposes? That should make us cautious. And, if God is love, could he not simply wipe the 'rap sheet' clean by his grace — *without* the cross? And, how could the greatest *miscarriage* of justice be a means to satisfy God's *requirements* for justice? And, while Anselm's theory can speak of cancelling sin, it has little to say to making us better people, healing humanity's sinful nature.

Substitutionary atonement is a hugely influential theory, especially within evangelical Christianity, but I'm not a fan!

Good Example

While the substitution of a legal penalty is associated with Anselm, another model is associated with his near contemporary — Peter Abelard, who emphasised that Jesus' death was a good example for us to follow. Christians seek to be Christ-like, to shape their lives after his pattern of love and action. He is the ideal pattern. John

says 'Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down their life for a friend.' If we look at the cross this way, we make sense of the rest of Jesus' life too. He was always a pattern of love, kindness, right living and truth-telling. He continues this way to his death, and then, even in resurrection, he continues: not seeking vengeance or 'justice' on Herod or Pilate who had crucified him, but walking with some of his followers to Emmaus, and seeking reconciliation with Peter over a fish breakfast. By contrast to Anselm, this theory has nothing to do with transactions, and everything to do with good influence, shaping the world into a better place by his example.

An 'Anti-Violence' Theory

Now: what if the cross was so far from being a sacrifice that it was divinely intended to be *anti*-sacrificial? A divine ultimate refusal of sacrifice? And a divine refusal of violence generally? This forms part of the world view of academic René Girard. Girard's theory begins with a recognition of the wide extent to which human behaviour is constructed around imitation, or mimesis, and that this can lead to a false sense of 'righteous violence', in which the justification for our actions seems beyond question because everyone who matters thinks like us. This is the nature of witch hunts and scapegoating. Jesus was the perfect scapegoat — innocent in every way, yet blamed by Herod, Pilate and the temple authorities. His crucifixion was approved by the crowd, but clearly disapproved of by their God, who, in bringing Jesus back to life, was vindicating him and expressing disagreement with the popular judgement.

This in turn brings into question all violence, and brings cause to doubt our judgement on others. It also calls into question sacrificial systems, which had been a part of Judaism, but which were also rife in contemporary religions.

Again — what I have described over two months is the beginning of an outline of some theory. There is usefulness and truth in each perspective. The best summary I have found for salvation theory comes from a statement of the Presbyterian Church of the USA in 1967:

"God's reconciling act in Jesus Christ is a mystery which the Scriptures describe in various ways. It is called the sacrifice of a lamb, a shepherd's life given for his sheep, atonement by a priest; again it is ransom of a slave, payment of a debt, vicarious satisfaction of a legal penalty, and victory over the powers of evil. These are expressions of a truth which remains beyond the reach of all theory in the depths of God's love for people. They reveal the gravity, cost, and sure achievement of God's reconciling work."

What I have expressed over these last two articles is an outline of the thought, meditation, wonder and gratitude of the Christian before the cross.

DUNWICH

ST JAMES CHURCH Grade II Listed Buttress is Given a Facelift



All Saints' Church was the last of eight medieval parish churches in Dunwich to succumb to erosion by the sea, but that too began to fall over the cliff in the early twentieth century. In 1923 the northwest buttress of the church tower was dismantled

before it fell and was re-erected in the churchyard of St James where it still stands, an iconic survivor of medieval Dunwich.

The original engraved inscription at the base of the buttress which explained its provenance had weathered and become partly illegible. With the approval of the Diocesan Advisory Committee and thanks to a generous grant from the Amenity and Accessibility Fund, a new plaque of Welsh slate has been placed over the original sandstone plaque. Slate was chosen to reflect the knapped flint on the buttress and church walls, and the dark church roof, while the new plaque was hand carved, with traditional mallet and chisel, by Stuart Buckle, a Suffolk-



based letter carver. The wording on the plaque is as appeared on the original:

> THE NORTH WEST BUTTRESS OF ALL SAINTS CHURCH DUNWICH THE LAST TRACE OF THE CHURCHES OF THE FIRST ANGLIAN CAPITAL AND SEE REMOVED FROM THE CLIFF TO THIS RESTING PLACE MARCH 1923

For the last 100 years the flint buttress has been an integral part of the churchyard in harmony with, and complementing, the flint-clad St James. The plaque has been designed to maintain and enhance this beauty so that those visiting St James or following the Dunwich Historic Trail will be aware of the historical significance of the buttress.

Mick moved to Westleton with his wife Helen and family in 1989. They bought the site at Moorside, demolished the railway carriage bungalow and built a family house. He worked at Sizewell B power station when it was under construction.

As a scouter for many years, he joined Leiston Scouts as assistant and later became leader. There will be many who remember his games at summer camp. He took early retirement from Sizewell and retrained as a florist, opening a small florist shop in Lowestoft. About the same time, he decided to explore his artistic talents and joined a group in Reydon. He was awarded the best watercolour painting in an exhibition in Southwold. Using his artistic talents, and with the help of local residents, he designed the wildflower altar frontal for St Peter's Church. He helped to start the model railway group in Westleton. He helped to start the model railway group in Westleton, which continues to florish.

When he retired from scouting he joined a Masonic Lodge in Halesworth, and later became a founder member of a Scout Lodge in Norfolk.

When the children left home and his mother had passed away, Mick and Helen decided to build their retirement home in the garden of Moorside Lodge. Marigold Cottage was built with the intention of being their final home but Mick was slowing down and later was diagnosed with prostate cancer. After his successful treatment they decided to move close to their daughter in Sutton Coldfield in 2017.

Leaving Westleton, which held so many wonderful memories, was hard, but being close to daughter and granddaughter was lovely. Mick managed a final trip to Westleton at the beginning of September 2024, although he and the dog, Tango, were not very well, it seemed a special few days for both. Mick passed away peacefully in Good Hope Hospital on 24th October, followed by Tango on 30th October. Known as Mick, Mike or Budgie he touched many lives with kindness and support. Treasured memories forever in our hearts.

Sizewell C has sent through notification that it intends making an order closing Willow Marsh Lane, Darsham from its junction with A12 Main Road for approximately 700m, and to the west of the railway line. The diversion route will be Sibton Green, Sibton Road, Yoxford Road, Walpole Road, A144 Darsham Road, A144 High Street, A12 London Road, A12 High Street and vice versa.

It is intended that the closure will operate from 27/01/2025 to 26/06/2027 but, if necessary, the order may remain in force until the Northern Park and Ride is in operation.

PROJECT UPDATE

FEBRUARY 2025

2025 is set to be a busy year for the project as we make progress on all of our associated developments. We will keep you informed throughout the year and our Works Tracker will be continuously updated. You can also check traffic management on the Suffolk County Council website.

The window to remove vegetation runs between October and February as it is the best time to avoid harm to wildlife. As we conduct our clearance work during this period you may notice a lot of activity around our associated developments, particularly along the A12.

We work with the local authorities to ensure that this is carried out guickly and safely with appropriate safeguards and mitigations for wildlife and natural habitats.

In order to make sure that wildlife such as newts have left their winter nests, the next ecological work will take place in May where we will be removing vegetation roots.

We have also finalised the designs for our community road improvements, and meetings to discuss the construction programme are due to take place.
