### Election

Will you be staying up all night watching the swingometer? Or are you bored by the circus? Or cynical? Sometimes I feel like I'm all three at once! Without being *party* political, here are some of my thoughts on the system.

1. Use your vote. We have so little influence on politics. We can petition, we can write to our MP, we can vote. The vote matters,

and we should use it.

2. I hate tactical voting. It is voting *against* what you dislike instead of for what you *actually want*. But if you voted for what you actually wanted (and others did the same) we would find out how popular your candidate and their policies really were. Otherwise we'll never know and we'll maintain the dominance of two parties and stifle the diversity of smaller parties that bring valuable different perspectives and nuance to our politics.

3. Character matters. If we were interviewing anyone for a job, we would want to know whether they *could* do the job, but also whether they *should* do the job. The first is about skills, the second about character. I am baffled that Trump still has such support in the US. So should we be voting for policies or the person? It's complicated, right? But we should value integrity, compassion and other aspects of good character in our politics as much as in our friends.

4. Read the manifesto. This has never been easier. The parties all have websites. It matters that we should read what they say their values are, and what they can achieve.

5. Talk about politics and religion at the table! This may be contrary to etiquette, but if we don't, we will never learn how to talk about these subjects, nor listen to differing opinions, nor learn to disagree well. That's a maturer way, right?

6. It's OK to change your mind. You don't want to be a weathervane, just pointing the way the wind is blowing, but you should be open to being persuaded, and to seeing with fresh eyes. That would be growth, wouldn't it? We should respect politicians who can change their minds and admit it. We should be open to changing our minds too.

7. Archbishop Desmond Tutu said: 'When people say that religion and politics don't mix, I wonder which Bible it is they are reading?' The church shouldn't seek political power, but Christians should be shaped by Christ.

However you vote, and whatever happens, we pray for God's blessing on the next government, and on this country.

## THEOLOGY CORNER



## The Trinity

While I have spoken about theology being the analysis of the story we find ourselves in, it is hard to do that analysis in order. Having spoken about God's nature last month, and focused on early Genesis to explore God's nature, we shall not, for now, move on to Adam and Eve and the problem of sin, but skip to the *last* major theological development of the church: the conclusion that God is 'trinity' — three persons and yet one God.

#### What does that mean?

This teaching says that there is only one God, and yet God shows himself as three persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Christianity is monotheistic, although the complexity of trinitarianism confuses many. If you were to ask Christ, say, '*What* are you?' he would say 'I am God'. If you were to ask, '*Who* are you?' He would say 'I am Christ'.

Can you imagine three persons who thought alike, who loved the same things and the same people, and who always acted in perfect co-operation without ever experiencing envy or competition, and who also felt the suffering of one of them equally? There is no single picture or understanding of the trinity that is sufficient on its own. We must build up to it, without investing all our thought into a single image.

#### Development of trinitarian theology

In the gospels Jesus says many different things about who he is. He says that he is the 'son of God' and the 'son of man' and the 'son of David'. He says that no one comes to the Father except through him, and says 'I and the Father are one'. The disciples understood that he was the Messiah (more on that another month) and occasionally dropped exclamations like 'my Lord and my God!' Despite the many extraordinary miracles, it was the transfiguration, the resurrection and the ascension that gave them the sense that he was more than just a great man blessed by God. The early church found that when they prayed they prayed to Jesus, and that this did not feel wrong. They referred to him as Lord (meaning Sir), but found that they were implying Lord (meaning the name of God). Paul concluded his second letter to the church in Corinth saying 'the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be always with you'. He didn't seem to intentionally imply trinity, but the apparent equality of persons implied nonetheless suggested it. In 'the great commission' of Matthew 28, Jesus says to 'make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.' Again, the implicit equality of status is striking.

Early theological thought began to talk of *persona*. A *persona* was literally a mask worn by an actor. They understood that God was the same God, but showed himself as different roles — creator, redeemer, sanctifier — just as one actor had many parts in the same play. They said that each persona had the same *substance* or *being*— that God was the same in essence whether Father, Son or Holy Spirit. And they needed the word *perichoresis* (from Greek: chorein —like choreography, dancing— and peri, around). How did the Trinity dance around? Because God is dynamic, and no person has a fixed place, but each person is involved in the work of the others. Character, and action and role of Father, Son and Holy Spirit interpenetrate.

#### How do we picture this?

Throughout the centuries we have used different images to try to capture this conundrum. St Patrick allegedly used a clover leaf — one leaf but three lobes. Others think of water, which can be ice, liquid or vapour, but the same substance. Or you might think of the sun, and the sun's rays, and the warmth you feel on your skin. Or perhaps the notes of a chord — three distinct notes, each distinguishable, yet also creating a chord which has its own character.

#### The Nicene creed

Of course, in such a difficult area of theology consensus was slow to develop, and alternatives were presented. One such was presented by Arius, a 4th Century Alexandrian, who argued that Son and Spirit must be subordinate to the Father. He was present at the Council of Nicaea in AD325, when the great theologians of the time gathered and debated this point. They came out eventually against Arius, and codified Christian belief in the 'Nicene Creed'. This statement was revised fifty-six years later in Constantinople, and, with one small alteration, is what we use today to declare our faith.

#### Why does it matter?

Getting this right matters because what we believe shapes who we are and how we act. Firstly, it is clear that God wants us to know him and love him — the incarnation says this above all. Wrestling with the complexity of God is part of knowing God, and coming close to God's heart.

If God is not trinity, then our theories of salvation and the Cross can become very ugly. Only good trinitarian theology can produce good salvation theology.

One of the most significant New Testament statements is that *God is love*. Understanding that God is unity in diversity actually gives us a very good image of what love looks like.

#### **Conclusion of sorts**

The nineteenth-century theologian Friedrich Schleiermacher said that trinity was the last word on God. A hundred years later Karl Barth turned this around, arguing that theology starts with trinity. We cannot usefully say anything about God until we have wrestled with who God is — not just as Father, but as Son, and Spirit too.

The chair asked about the progress of the Hinton incinerator planning application. There is to be a meeting on 9th July at which Richard Smith will be speaking against the plans for the incinerator.

Pete Holmes was co-opted onto the Parish Council and his initial portfolio will include speeding.

Planning application for dormer adjustment and other work at 14 Fairfields was supported and a planning application for the construction of four link-detached dwellings on The Street adjacent to 1 Fox Cottages was strongly opposed.

The PC accepted the resignation of Councillor David Stanley and would like to thank him for all his hard work managing the allotments, including getting a mains water supply and repairing all the fencing. There is therefore a vacancy on the PC and anyone interested should contact the Parish Clerk

## D-Day 80th Anniversary, Thursday 6th June

The St James Church flag was raised to commence the commemoration of this significant historical event. In the Reading Room, there was a fascinating exhibition mounted by Dunwich Museum, including an interview with a veteran, unseen images, and objects from the village's wartime history.

In the early evening, over thirty people joined in with National Fish & Chip Day at Flora Tea Rooms, with thanks due to Christian, Sarah and their staff for staying open and providing delicious food. This raised £170 for the Merchant Navy Association.

As the sun went down, Dunwich's own veteran Gwynne lit the beacon (erected by Dave Cole to mark the millennium) and read the D-Day Tribute. Gwynne joined

the RAF aged 18 and, after training, served as a rear gunner on Lancaster bombers. At the end of the war he stayed on with Lancasters, dropping air supplies over the Netherlands and bringing back troops from Italy. After the war he trained as a teacher and taught History and English. He came to Suffolk to teach in the early 1960s and retired to Dunwich with his wife Maureen twenty years ago. ## MIDDLETON CUM FORDLEY OPEN GARDENS WEEKEND

Thank you to all those who made their way to Middleton for the 2024 Open Gardens. Once again, we had a wide selection of gardens, fifteen in all; with one new garden, which had been designed on the basis of a visit to the Westleton Garden Trail last year to see what grew well in this part of Suffolk (this was reciprocated by a visitor to last year's open garden, showing their garden in Westleton this year); and two popular gardens making a return. Eighteen gardens last year turned out to be a marathon for many; so, a couple of gardens took a break this year and we hope to see them back next year.

This year, under the banner of a Creative Cornucopia, there was the addition of art, photographs, ceramics, etchings and a vintage sale by residents and friends, in the village hall.

This year the event was so popular we ran out of cake before the close on Sunday, a good problem to have. It didn't stop us raising £4,000 which will enable us to give £600 to East Suffolk Mind, who were with us for the weekend, sharing their ambition to make Suffolk the best place to receive support for mental health and wellbeing; £200 will go to Project40seven (IP17) who provide a space that offers positive ways to engage and support each other in our local community; the remainder will assist us to undertake essential repairs at Holy Trinity Church, helping us to keep our beautiful church building open to all, and at the heart of the community.

Thank you to all those who opened their gardens, big and small, all inspiring, all works of love, dedication and creativity; thank you to all those who helped and worked hard to make the event such a success with such warm heartedness; and thank you to those of you who attended and took part, and made this event continue to flourish and grow.

#### **MIDDLETON WI NEWS**

At our May meeting Lynda welcomed Claire O'Sullivan from Contemporary Hempery to tell us about "The Long History of Hemp". It was first grown in China 12,000 years ago and gradually



made its way west. There is evidence that the Anglo-Saxons grew hemp for making cloth. In East Anglia the hemp industry thrived from 1550-1820. It was used for clothing, household linens and ships' ropes and sails. Here in the Waveney valley the spinning and weaving of hemp fibres was an important cottage industry for rural families. The industry, never mechanised, gradually died away with the coming of cheap imported cotton and the invention of the spinning jenny and the 1812 power loom. The last hemp company in this area closed in 1925. At Contemporary Hempery in Fressingfield, Claire and her team are using traditional skills to revive this local industry. Industrial Hemp is planted in May, grows quickly without the need for pesticides or herbicides, and at 10 feet tall is ready to be harvested in August with a small mechanised cutter. The stalks are gathered up in bunches by hand. The whole process of getting these stalks to fibres ready for spinning is done by hand: retting (soaking the stalks) scutching (bashing with wood) heckling (combing with horse nail brushes). The combed, softened fibres are spun into yarn ready for the weaving loom. At the moment production is small but Claire is hopeful that the hemp industry can grow because there are 25,000

uses for hemp: oil, food, cosmetics, textiles, hempcrete, insulation, animal bedding to name a few. Contemporay Hempery holds open days and we thought a visit there would be most interesting!

In July we will be having our annual Garden Party. Let us hope that the weather will be fine. *Lynne Venn*

Nicky's Foundation Inclusive Livelihood Skills Project is now in its third year and aims to overcome the following local issues:

- There are few rehabilitation services and inclusive schools to provide disabled children/young people with both skills and knowledge required for employment.
- Most employers lack knowledge of disability-related issues and are reluctant to incur costs to adapt their environment to ensure it is accessible to all.
- Some people still believe that disabilities are contagious or a punishment for sin, so prefer to isolate disabled people.
- Some family members still have a negative perception about disabled children and see them as a burden and not worth investing in.

For as little as £45 per month a trainee/apprentice will receive training and mentoring in their chosen subject.

All donations will help us. It might be that nine people can give £5 per month or three people can give £15 per month. but any amount is very very welcome as all donations will help us to continue to offer people with a disability a life changing opportunity.

### WESTLETON PARISH COUNCIL

In May, Westleton residents participated in a survey asking which of the traffic calming measures, first presented in February, they would still want in the event that EDF and the local Councils approved the installation of Average Speed Cameras on the B1125 at the entrance/exits of the village. Many thanks to everyone who submitted their views. The Parish Council presented the results of the consultation at the Annual Parish meeting on 20th May.

The very good news is that at meeting of the B1125 Working Group on 11th June, EDF and the local Councils announced that Average Speed cameras will be installed in Westleton on the B1125. Consequently, the Parish Council presented the results of the residents' consultation. EDF and its traffic consultants are now amending the plans. More information about the implementation of traffic calming measures can be found on Westleton Parish Council Website, the village notice board and in the Village Hall. During the May Parish Council surgery, a resident raised concern about the Leiston Surgery's decision to stop the Village Shop prescription service. The surgery staff have explained that the decision was imposed upon them by the Care Quality Commission and cannot be reversed. The surgery has, however, sent letters to all residents who regularly used the service. The letter explained why the decision was taken and that the surgery is happy to talk to any one with concerns. Any resident who feels that they should have received such a letter, but did not, should call the surgery on 01728 830526 and ask to speak with the dispensary team. Prescriptions can now be collected from:

- The Leiston Surgery: Monday to Friday 8:00am-6:30pm
- The Yoxford Surgery: Monday and Fridays 10:00am-12:00pm.
