Rector's Ramble



During one of the services we held during Lent we shocked the congregation by playing a song by Stormzy: 'Give it to the water'. Paul, who suggested it, told me that it would be one of his desert island discs. Stormzy is a musician who is real about his struggles in life, but keeps coming back to his Christian faith. In 'Give it to the water', the 'water' is the Holy Spirit.

I was initially surprised at Paul's high regard for this song. Snobbery on my part? Probably — but I admit it is a great song! I think part of my surprise is that for a song to make anyone's top ten is *very* high praise. And, if you're older than the age of, say, twenty-five, I bet your desert island discs are pieces of music that you've known for years.

I've been to a few hi-fi shows (you wouldn't believe how good, or how expensive hi-fi can be!) and at some point in the day you'll always hear 'Dark Side of the Moon'. It's a well recorded album, of course, but the kind of guys who go to hi-fi shows still *really* like an album that's half a century old.

There's a programme on Radio 3 similar to Desert Island Discs called *Private Passions*, which is usually playing on a Sunday lunchtime as I drive home from my second service. It's interesting to hear accomplished people talk about their lives, and intersperse these interviews with music. They always manage to weave their music into their life stories: 'I've always loved order and precision and it was the works of J. S. Bach that led me to becoming a brain surgeon' — that sort of thing. We are fascinated by peoples' lives. We are fascinated by what music they love and why. It's a great formula.

I would cheat horribly were I on one of these programmes. I'd try to get Wagner's *Ring* cycle (four operas lasting fourteen hours in total) in as one item. At various times I've written out my lists of favourite pieces: Mahler 2, Beethoven 9, Prokofiev, Tchaikovsky, Sibelius — and the lists get longer and longer. You, however, are going to have very different choices. And that's rather wonderful!

Speaking of favourites: to mark the end of Yoxfayre we'll be holding a 'Songs of Praise' service at 3pm on Sunday 6th July. This will feature as many of our favourite hymns as we can fit into one service. See you there?

THEOLOGY CORNER



Muscular Christianity

One of the major influences on my Christian growth was Guildford Crusaders, part of the Crusader Union, which now calls itself 'Urban Saints'. This was (and is) a Christian group for boys between 11 and 18, founded around knowing and worshipping Jesus, and lots of outdoor fun. Each year there was a summer half-term camp and then a summer camp, often in Cornwall, attended by something like a hundred boys and leaders. We did sports and games, various levels of rough and

tumble, trips and adventures. And looking back at it, it was a direct descendant of the Victorian idea of 'muscular Christianity'.

Muscular Christianity started as a movement in boys' public schools. In 1828 Thomas Arnold became the headmaster of Rugby school and began to deal with ill-discipline by establishing a much more serious programme of sports than the school had seen. Nearly thirty years later, Thomas Hughes's book *Tom Brown's School Days* caused the wider spread of these principles, which were bound into four key areas of behaviour: respect, cooperative obedience, perseverance and self-discipline. Through sport the young Christian gentlemen learnt to live by a code of conduct of fair play, respect and self control — the things they were being taught in chapel. It was massively influential. But it was also a movement that functioned as a reaction to perceptions of the church growing 'weak' and 'effeminate.'

I read recently a BBC News article entitled: 'Young US men are joining Russian churches promising "absurd levels of manliness". (This can be found at <u>http://bit.ly/4e1GT36</u>.) The article talks of American men joining churches belonging to the Russian Orthodox Church Outside Russia. Again, it is reactionary: at least some part of this Orthodox 'manly' church is a reaction against gender issues and 'woke'. Men joining the church seem to crave a return to 'traditional' values: men are the bread-winners, a woman's place is in the home, birth-control is for losers. For me, what is even more troubling is that, according to the article, this Russian Orthodoxy is convincing followers that Putin is a Christian man, and that Ukraine deserves little sympathy for the invasion. Is this muscular Christianity, or something more sinister? The 'anti' bits of both movements trouble me. The term 'woke' originated with African Americans in the 1930s — the idea that we should 'wake up' to discrimination, prejudice and social inequalities. More recently this has come to include LGBTQIA+ rights, anger at continuing white privilege, and more. The term became derogatory (from the right wing) from about 2019 — implying insincerity, or 'performative' activism.

My twopence worth is this: 'woke' is right. We should wake up to discrimination and prejudice. These are very real injustices and anyone wanting others to stop talking about it would be best to do so by working towards a more equal world. I don't recall Jesus ever telling minorities to stop whinging. I do think he preached about good Samaritans who helped their enemies, and he stood up for women. The early church, following in his footsteps, embraced radical change: understanding that in Christ 'there is neither man nor woman, Jew or gentile, slave or free' — surely a 'woke' agenda?

Much of the issue seems to be about control. White straight men perceive their control being taken from them. They respond with 'muscularity', but the attacks they perceive are because of their control, not their whiteness, nor their sex. But if they are claiming Christianity as their ally then they must beware: Jesus never looks much like a 'muscular' figurehead — a resolutely celibate, poor itinerant preacher who speaks of turning the other cheek; a man who does not trade accusations with Pilate; a man who submits to the cross, and, in his resurrection, does not take justice into his own hands. A man who is good at listening to women! It doesn't sound very muscular, does it? But it does sound like respect, cooperative obedience, perseverance, self-control, courage and compassion — the qualities espoused by Victorian muscular Christianity and that we should all respect, whatever our gender.

The muscular Christianity that I knew through Crusaders, and that Victorian boys knew, was certainly not perfect. But I did learn a faith that embraced Jesus' promise that he had come to give us life to the full, and embraced the idea that Christianity meant *doing* something — energetically serving, helping, and challenging injustice. And doing it joyfully. That idea of 'muscular Christianity' still has a place, surely?

The Plant and Bake Sale took place on 24th May and raised an amazing £2,200! It was great to see so many visitors and was lovely to chat over plants, paintings, cakes and a cuppa. The money raised will be directed to our Inclusive Livelihood Skills Centre in Mamfe, Cameroon which continues to give young people with disabilities an opportunity to learn entrepreneurial skills along with basic literacy and numeracy classes for those who have not had a chance to go to school. Lots of visitors at the sale expressed an interest in the work of Nicky's Foundation which, in addition to the Livelihood Skills Centre, extends into an established community based rehabilitation service. The work is challenging as the team are dedicated to reaching very rural villages in order to make sure information and help gets to people who are most in need. By donating to Nicky's Foundation on a regular basis you will be supporting our ongoing work and helping us plan for the future. For example:

- £10 a month can buy a school uniform and books to equip a child for school;

- £17 a month for a year will fund cataract surgery to allow a child to see again;

- £32 a month for a year would correct clubfoot deformity for a child allowing them to walk for the first time.

We presume these were put there many years ago to stop swifts from nesting, so we are very pleased that they were not deterred and are now able to nest more safely. PROJECT UPDATE

JULY 2025

Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

You may have seen recent media coverage regarding the funding of Sizewell C. On Tuesday 10 June, the UK government gave the go-ahead for Sizewell C. This is the first Britishowned nuclear power station to be announced in over three decades, with the government as a majority shareholder alongside EDF.

The Chancellor confirmed £14.2 billion of investment will be allocated to the project. It is the first nuclear power station in the UK to be funded through a Regulated Asset Base (RAB) model. Under the model, consumers are protected through independent regulation, strict cost controls, and transparent oversight - so families benefit from secure, low-carbon energy without the risk of cost overruns.

We are aware there are several key summer events coming up. We are in direct contact with Latitude and will work around their peak traffic times and remove our HGVs. For the Ed Sheeran concerts at Portman Road, there will not be any disruption at the A12 around Darsham Station. We will also not have any HGV movements during the Aldeburgh Carnival. The closure of Willow Marsh Lane will require cyclists on the Dunwich Dynamo to take the official diversion so we will actively communicate this on social media. GPS maps have been updated so riders can follow the designated route.

We have now installed average speed cameras along the B1122 and B1125 to further enhance road safety for the 30mph speed limit. We are also upgrading the temporary Sizewell C A-frame signs along the A14, A12 and local roads to permanent signs on posts. Further speed restrictions along the A12 are being implemented, including south of Yoxford, to ensure road safety as HGVs and construction vehicles manoeuvre on the sites. Further speed restrictions will be implemented in due course on the A12 at Darsham and the Friday Street turning.

Preparation for the Friday Street Roundabout is ongoing, with a works compound being established, and the vegetation and tree clearance along the A12 is almost complete. Site preparation along the twovillage bypass route around Farnham and Stratford St Andrew is also ongoing, and Yoxford Roundabout is being prepared for construction.

Village Picnic

Unfortunately, we have taken the decision to **cancel the planned village picnic** which was due to be held on Sunday July 6. This is a very busy time of the year for village clubs and our selected date fell between a number of other village events making it hard for clubs and individuals to commit. For a small village, we are blessed with a large number of very active clubs, and an unintended consequence of this very positive fact is that it seemed to us that the picnic was going to be an event too far... We do, though, hope that there is enthusiasm for a village event in future years.

The Parish Council has registered to be an *interested party* for the Planning Inspectorate's Examination of the Sea Link cabling and converter station project. In our submission, we stated our objection to the National Grid's Sea Link plans on the following grounds: that the project will generate more traffic on local roads already suffering from the Sizewell C construction; that it will result in more destruction of the local environment; and that it will involve the construction of large industrial buildings completely disproportionate to the environment in which they are proposed to be sited. We therefore called for a planning reset to prevent the needless destruction of the Suffolk heritage coastline and at the same time to deliver the energy more efficiently and more appropriately to the point of use. The Parish Council will make these points in greater detail during the hearings which will last six months.

The next Parish Council Surgery will be on June 30th, 10-30-11.30 in the Village Hall Foyer. The surgery is an opportunity for residents to raise concerns/ask questions to the Parish Council.

WESTLETON WI

Our speaker for the June meeting was Genevieve Broad. Her mother Vivian was a Land Army Girl in the Second World War. The Land Army was formed in 1917, during WW1, when there were



fears about food security for the country. 20,000 women had volunteered in the First World War. By the time WW2 was raging, 200,000 women signed up to work on the land, producing 70% of Britain's food. They were involved in milking cows, lambing, managing poultry, harvesting crops, digging ditches, farm maintenance

and catching rats! Army wages were not generous. For a 50-hour week in the summer and a bit less in the winter, they earned 28 shillings, against a man's wage for the same work of 38 shillings, and they *never* had a holiday. For their services they did get a proficiency badge.

In 1943, Lady Denman introduced a charter to improve working conditions for the women, also giving them a week's holiday every year. Eventually, to make amends, in 2005 a monument was put up in Whitehall, symbolising "The Women of WW2". In 2008, surviving WLA veterans were awarded a badge of honour as recognition of all their hard work and a letter of thanks signed by the then Prime Minister Gordon Brown. In 2014, a memorial to the Land Army and the Timber Corps was erected and unveiled at the National Memorial Aboretum in Staffordshire.

Gen's mother Vivian worked at farms in three West Suffolk villages, Wordwell, Lackford and Herringswell. Here she learned to scythe and gathered mangoldbeets to feed cattle. She had to take a horse and cart with a tank aboard and collect river water for the farm animals to drink. She was involved in hoeing the sugar beet before breakfast and almost daily watched the flights of the Lancaster bombers returning to base at first light. The hours spent shovelling muck onto 'tumblers' or wooden carts led to Vivian having amazing arm muscles and she remained strong into later life.

Vivian was very good with horses and she became known as 'The Horse Girl', getting up at 5.30am, collecting the horses from the meadow, grooming them and harnessing them before they were put to work on the farm.

Thanks Gen, a very informative meeting.

Update from Stop Sizewell C

10th June saw the sad and frustrating news that the government had chosen to invest £14.2bn of our (taxpayers') money into Sizewell C. However, this was not a Final Investment Decision and there were huge gaps in the information provided, including what the project will cost, and how much consumers will pay on their bills during construction.

It is now speculated that a Final Investment Decision could take place between 8th and 10th July, when French President Emmanuel Macron is paying a State Visit to the UK, but it has been promised so many times before!

Ahead of the Spending Review, Stop Sizewell C carried out a projection onto the dome of Sizewell B and also co-organised a well-attended "Outrage" rally on Sizewell beach with Together Against Sizewell C. Among the speakers were Emily and Amy, the courageous daughters of campaigner Pete Wilkinson who passed away in January. The event ended with tying yellow ribbons to the fences at Sizewell C.
