John 12.1-8



12 Angry Men

A few years ago, I watched the film *12 Angry Men* for the first time, and the other day I watched it again. It's a phenomenal film.

Twelve male jurors leave the courtroom on a hot, sweaty evening, to deliberate the case of a teenager who has stabbed his father to death with a switchblade. A quick poll reveals that eleven out of the

twelve believe he's guilty beyond reasonable doubt. The eleven are frustrated with Juror 8, who is yet to be convinced. 'Whaddaya mean?' they ask. 'Look at the facts! Anyone can see he's guilty!' But Juror 8 quietly argues that it's *possible* the kid didn't do it. 'We should just talk', he says, 'before sending a youth to the electric chair.'

And so they talk, and as they talk questions emerge. Could the neighbour downstairs *really* have heard shouting when the train was going past? Was the knife really unique? Are the witnesses lying? And how much are the jurors leaping to their verdict because of prejudice, or impatience to get to a ball game, or a tendency to go with the flow, or an inability to just think?

Sydney Lumet's film captures the claustrophobia of the jury room during the heatwave, the disparate characters (wonderfully portrayed by an ensemble cast) and the dynamics of twelve people wrestling with doubt and responsibility.

Juror 8, played by Henry Fonda, is the hero. It takes remarkable courage to disagree under pressure, and then to lead others through your doubts with clarity. But Juror 9 (the 'old man') soon joins him and has the insight to raise the final doubt that undermines the certainty of all but the last juror.

This 1957 film (and its teleplay and stage play predecessors) was written as a critique of justice during McCarthy era America, but it stands to this day to remind us of the fragility of justice. Our court system works the same way to this day, but so much depends on the presentation skills of the defence and the prosecution. And what about the capacity for jurors to understand complexity and nuance, and to set aside their own baggage?

To reflect more on the justice process you could come to our Lent course on Christian Ethics, running from 9th March to 13th April at 4pm in Darsham Village Hall. But also, do watch *12 Angry Men*. It's electrifying filmmaking. *Blessings, Tim.*

ELECTORAL ROLLS

So please make sure you sign up, so you can (continue to) shape the church and the church's future.

PCCs are always looking for people who can help the church to flourish. Is God calling you to join your local PCC? A number of PCCs could use more help, and if you fancy being a treasurer, you could do an amazing service to your church, but do not have to be a full PCC member. Thank you.

THEOLOGY CORNER



THE CHURCH

After the cross, resurrection and ascension of Jesus, the next big event of the New Testament was the formation of the church. The disparate group of followers who had cowered in the face of Roman persecution on Good Friday became an extraordinarily dynamic, fearless organisation on the day of Pentecost, just fifty days after Easter. Living as if they had the cheat-code on death, they enthusiastically proclaimed the salvation of Christ crucified and risen, and people in their thousands came to

believe. The faith spread quickly across Israel, and then rapidly across the Roman empire. This story is recounted in the book of the Acts of the Apostles. But how did they go from this rag-tag band towards an organised church? And why does church and worship take the shape it does now?

In the very earliest days, the Christians continued to meet together at the Jerusalem temple. When they were no longer welcome, they met together in peoples' houses, as regularly as possible. Their patterns of worship would have been inherited from Judaism, and included reading scripture (initially what we call the Old Testament), the singing of psalms or spiritual songs, prayer, and talk. These communities shared their food and money freely with each other, cared for the poor, and had a stunning social impact.

As time passed, the informal organisation became more formalised, as happens when things grow. The early church was marked by servant-heartedness. A person who served in the church became known as a *diakonos*, literally a servant, someone who waits at tables. We get our word 'deacon' from it. Today every priest is first ordained a deacon, a servant.

In each church fellowship there were some who became acknowledged leaders or 'elders'. The Greek for an elder is *presbuteros*. From this we get 'presbyter', as in 'presbyterian'. Clergy today fulfil the role of the early *presbuteroi*. And then, as the church continued to grow, one of these leaders became the designated overseer for the churches of each city or region. The word for an overseer was *episcopos* from which we get our words 'episcopal', and 'bishop'. Again, informal structures became more established over time and the supremacy of the bishop of Rome was confirmed, following in Peter's footsteps. While the modern church has more designations and titles, the basic structure is still the same as in the early church, with bishops, priests and deacons.

The Ethos of the Church

What is a church? It is not the building — these were constructed much later. No, the church is simply the people of God, the community of salvation, called into being by God's saving work, and in order to further that work. The church is the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12) and branches of the true vine (John 15). The church is a people called not to be served but to serve. The church is marked by the presence and activity of the Holy Spirit. The church uses the two sacraments authorised by Jesus — baptism and holy communion, but may have variations in how these are performed. The church is marked by the word — we read the Bible, the word of God, and we also preach it — interpreting it for our generation.

Following debates and disputes over theology in the first few hundred years of the church the Nicene creed was written in AD325 - 1700 years ago this year. Since then, the Nicene creed has been a point of unity in the church. Catholic, Protestant and Orthodox churches all agree to this belief statement (with one small verbal difference for the Orthodox church).

The worldwide Anglican church (wider than the C of E), is held together by agreement on four points: the use of Scripture; the Nicene and Apostles' creeds; the sacraments; and the historic episcopate. This broad agreement is called the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral.

The Nicene creed talks of the church as being 'one holy catholic and apostolic church.' What does that mean?

Firstly — while it true that there are denominations and divisions, we still believe in the unity of the church. We all preach Christ crucified, risen and ascended. We have the same creed and Bible.

The church is Holy. The people may not always be so holy (and we're sorry about that!) but the church is holy because it is focused on Christ, who is holy.

'Catholic' means universal, not specifically Roman Catholic. Your local church is part of a bigger church. We are one body and no one is beyond the pale of salvation. The church should preach the *whole* doctrine of the *whole* of scripture, of the *whole* of salvation for *all* the people.

And finally, it is 'apostolic' — derived from the witness of the apostles, and seeking to go on witnessing to God's love and grace in the way the apostles did.

Is that a bit of an answer to what the church is?

LASTING POWERS OF ATTORNEY: WHAT ARE THEY AND DO I NEED ONE?

It is estimated that there are more than one million people in the UK who are suffering from some form of dementia. Alongside this, we live in an increasingly bureaucratic world where permissions and authority to deal with day-to-day tasks concerning financial resources and legal issues are becoming the norm.

Powers of Attorney (PoA) exist in various forms within the law and are used for different tasks. Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs) were created under the Mental Capacity Act 2005. There are two versions of the LPA and each deal with different aspects of person's life, giving peace of mind.

- 1. The *finance & property* LPA allows the attorney to deal with all aspects of the donor's (the person making it) finances and property needs, such as pensions, banking, housing or investment.
- 2. The *health & welfare* LPA allows the attorney (nominated trusted person) to make decisions for the donor concerning their health care and even their hospital treatment. This is incredibly powerful as it allows the attorney to make decisions with doctors and even to overrule medical professionals if needed.

Both LPAs provide greater powers for the attorney and are registered with the Office of the Public Guardian, thus giving them greater authority. The LPAs replace the old Enduring Power of Attorney, which may need updating if you have one.

LPAs can operate whilst a donor (the person making it) still has mental capacity, and thus can be used to manage their day-to-day affairs when they are absent or needing help. By having a registered LPA it also avoids the time-consuming and costly issues of making an application to appoint guardians when a person loses capacity, and allows the donor to choose those whom they trust to be their attorneys and look after their affairs.

An LPA can be made online, but LPA forms are fiddly and can be confusing, and many clients prefer to use a solicitor. Fees for filing are fixed regardless of who makes the application. It is difficult to correct errors once an LPA has been made, and errors can invalidate an LPA registration. In addition, it is possible for you to put special conditions into an LPA, so specific advice is advisable when considering. Furthermore, solicitors are authorised to be Certificate providers as to a donor's capacity when making an LPA. Oliver Charles

Sizewell C's (SZC) Northern Transport Forum took place on 5th February. Alongside the depressing news that 21,675 trees have already been cleared from the site, SCZ announced that: work proper will begin on the Darsham Park and Ride, the Yoxford and Friday Street roundabouts and the Sizewell Link Road in late spring/early summer; that a stretch of the B1122 between Theberton and Leiston will be closed

8pm-5am from 3 March to 9 May; and that the Darsham Crossing will likely have to be closed for (at least) one weekend to allow its upgrade. SCZ have said that its HGV traffic will not be diverted through Westleton. SCZ's presentation from the meeting will be posted on the Westleton Parish Council website once they are available.

PROJECT UPDATE

MARCH 2025

There has been good progress on the Sizewell C project in the first months of 2025.

We are also pleased to announce the launch of the new Stzewell C online works tracker. The navigation has been improved and you can now sign up for email updates each time the works tracker is updated. We will be extending this to an SMS service later in the year. You can also check traffic management on the Suffolk County Council website Causeway one.network.

We are continuing to remove vegetation where necessary, which is overseen by an ecological clerk of work to ensure we avoid harm to wildlife.

As we conduct our clearance work during this period you may notice a lot of activity around our associated developments, particularly along the A12.

We have begun to implement the long term and necessary road closures that host our infrastructure projects. Notably, Willow Marsh Lane (A12 junction in Darsham) and Abbey Lane (Leiston) with diversions in place which you can find further details of on our works tracker.

As the designs and contractors are being agreed, we are beginning to firm up key dates of activity. Over the next month you will see enabling works to create the Yoxford roundabout which will improve safety at a busy junction, with construction commencing in March.

We have also made further progress on the park and ride sites that will provide buses for workers to access site, reducing the number of vehicles on local roads.

Rail works also continue at pace and we have had several deliveries of rail track ahead of track laying. This will allow the first trains to move down the Leiston branch line to bring materials to our site on Buckleswood Road.
