#### Memory

About fifteen years ago a young man called Joshua Foer attended the US memory championships. He was a journalist and had been curious to find and interview the cleverest person alive. But that was a hard task to achieve — because absolute intelligence is hard to judge. But memory *could* be judged in competition, and memory is an important

component of intelligence — or so he reasoned.

Competitors were remembering the order of shuffled packs of cards, and hundreds of digits of pi. In breaks, Josh would find competitors and ask "When did you discover you had a great memory?" He was surprised by the usual answer: "I don't."

And that led Josh to discover a world of techniques by which you can leverage your memory to hold onto difficult stuff. So, numbers are hard to remember, but objects and places are not, so by translating numbers into objects in places they become much more memorable — better suited to a hunter-gatherer brain that was focused on tracking deer and gathering roots and fruit. Repetition is another tool — the things you repeatedly rehearse stick in your memory eventually.

The next year, Josh competed in the finals of the memory championships. He had learnt his lessons well. All this is chronicled in his book *Moonwalking with Einstein*. It's a good read, I promise.

I had a go at putting this into practice, to see how well it works. I learnt the kings and queens of England — including their dates of accession. I learnt the periodic table: not just in order, but so that you could say a number and I could tell you what element it was and vice versa. I can't do it now — if you don't practise, you forget again.

Knowing how to remember is very useful, but it is a different sort of memory to that which we practise in November. All Saints and All Souls remember the great examples of the Christian faith, and remember the faithful departed. On 5th November we remember gunpowder treason and plot, while Remembrance Sunday commemorates the courage and self-sacrifice of those who gave their lives in the wars, but also the awfulness of war, lest we forget.

Remembering a pack of cards is impressive. Remembering the lessons of the past is vital. Forgetting phone numbers is a nuisance. Forgetting the lessons of the past is tragic. This November, I pray that we remember well.

#### DISABILITY ADVICE SERVICE

The Disability Advice Service (East Suffolk) has been working across the East Suffolk and Ipswich communities for thirty-seven years supporting children and adults with disability related problems, including their family carers. We provide practical solutions to address the financial issues which impact on the wellbeing of our clients.

The following case study illustrates the kind of support we can provide. Denise (not her real name) contacted us as she was assessed by the DWP as having zero points for her PIP (Personal Independence Payment). As a result of an assessment by DAS, we raised a Mandatory Reconsideration action with the DWP. A member of the DAS appeals team then spent time going over the client's case with her and identified areas where she might be able to better present the impact of her disability to the DWP.

Unfortunately, following a PIP re-submission the assessment was not altered, so the DAS appeals officer then submitted a formal appeals application. Following this, the DWP awarded the client allowances for "enhanced rate daily living" and "enhanced rate mobility". Denise also received £7278.23 in arrears. The whole process took three months and considerable work, but the end result more than justified the effort!

#### THEOLOGY CORNER



#### The problem of evil

Right from the earliest pages of the Bible we are presented with the big problem that needs to be solved. God is good, and creation is good, and yet there is evil. If God created all things, *did God create evil?*? And, given that we mostly don't accept that premise, where did evil come from, and what is the solution?

In Genesis, we read about Adam and Eve, directly after the account of creation. They may eat any fruit they like except one. The snake comes and tempts them and they

eat this forbidden fruit. Eating this reveals to them that they are naked — they feel ashamed, hide from God, and God expels them from Eden. Thereafter the descent into evil is rapid: Adam and Eve have sons Cain and Abel, Cain kills Abel out of jealousy, and from there evil spreads as rapidly as humanity spreads. And the Bible does not gloss over the evil actions of its protagonists.

Today, as much as at any point in time, we ask: if God is good, how does he allow so much evil?

A good answer is not straightforward. One explanation, offered by many belief systems, is that the struggle between good and evil is fairly equal — neither side wins, and so we keep on fighting for order and justice against selfishness and disorder. Christianity (and Judaism) doesn't accept this somewhat depressing answer. God is creator and sustainer of the world. We do not accept that God could lose this battle. Another explanation is required, and it is found within the Adam and Eve story.

God has made all things good, and also given humankind free will. Adam and Eve have choice. They can choose to eat the regular fruit... or they can choose to disobey God. They are tempted and succumb to temptation and disobey. Once they have disobeyed, disobedience becomes easier.

Are they tempted by the fruit itself? Or the chance to be like God, knowing good and evil? The story suggests it is a bit of both. The snake hints that God might be keeping the best for himself, and so he sparks envy, and envy leads into wrongdoing.

Now, without free will they could not sin, but with free will, they did. One of the conundrums here is that free will seems very important to us. What if you were put in prison before you had done anything wrong? Would that seem justified?

Would that seem good? No. We prize our freedom very highly. So does God. This will sound trite to many. What if God were to give us all freedom, but at times to stay the hand of the most evil aggressors? To an extent the Bible suggests that this *can* happen: in Exodus God compels Egypt's Pharaoh to release the Hebrews from slavery. He intervenes again as this small tribe reclaims the land they had once lived in, and again at times when Israel would be wiped out by neighbouring nations. All distinct interventions by God. **But**, God is parsimonious in these interventions — apparently unwilling to stay the hand of Hitler, Stalin or any other evil power. Why?

There are two things here. If God intervened relentlessly, we would not really be free, and we would never learn.

To go back to the first point: God has made us capable of great good and great evil. We have that choice. God would like us to choose good over evil, but he does not compel us. He does not threaten to punish us for our evil although he does allow us to suffer the consequences of our actions. If God wielded his power too regularly and obviously, humankind would comply to the law out of fear, not out of free will or love.

Instead, God seems to expect humankind to learn and mature. To learn that sin has repercussions, just as playing with matches gets you burnt.

"What about law?" you ask. "Religion has always dictated the law!" You are right. The ten commandments outline both the worst excesses of evil — murder, adultery, robbery, deceit — and also the principles of keeping your thoughts and behaviour in check: by honouring the Lord, respecting your parents, and not coveting your neighbour's property.

The problem is: law doesn't do a very good job of keeping sin in check. It guides, but doesn't really change our nature.

What we really need is a change of heart, so that we are free to do evil, but choose not to. This is where Jesus comes in: Jesus' death on a cross may not seem like the solution to the problem of evil, but next month we will discuss why it just might be.

We have many different types of journeys being taken every day: getting children safely to school, you to and from work, and - when the weather's lovely - trips to the seaside. We also hire



out minibuses to local community groups for use for their activities.

However, we still desperately need volunteer drivers so that we can help provide transport for those unable to drive or who cannot physically use public transport. You can give anything from a few hours to a whole day; you can either use your own car (vehicle expenses will be covered), or we can get you trained to drive one of our minibuses.

#### MIDDLETON WI NEWS

At our September meeting President Irene welcomed all members and introduced our speaker Mary Newton, a forensic biologist.



Mary gave us a talk entitled "Blood, Sweat and Fears" about her forty-year career in the Forensic Science Service at the London Laboratory in Lambeth, although for the final seven years she was as an independent consultant on how to investigate rape cases, which took her all over the country. Mary wanted us to know that forensic science is difficult and mundane - not as glamorous as on CSI. No assumptions can be made and you must be meticulous and tenacious and work as part of a team. She loved it. At first she went out to crime scenes with very little protective clothing, but that has now changed to the scientist wearing a coverall, two pairs of gloves, a facemask and boots. The rise of DNA technology since 2003 made this imperative as the investigator should not leave any of their DNA at the scene. DNA sequencing can be used on blood, semen, saliva, hair and skin cells. Evidence from old cases can be re-examined when needed.

Mary then talked about how she and her team worked on two well known murder cases: those of Lin and Meghan Russell in Kent and Stephen Lawrence in London. The evidence was examined, and then re-examined as the DNA techniques became more advanced. Mary was also a consultant on the first series of *Silent Witness*. The TV production team didn't listen to her advice but made the portrayal of forensics much more dramatic than it is. It was a fascinating talk. Irene thanked her for entertaining us.

In November our meeting will be an afternoon AGM on the 20th at 2.30pm.

#### WESTLETON PARISH COUNCIL

Many thanks to all of you who completed the Housing Needs Survey earlier this year. The results showed a need for affordable housing, and 93% of respondents also supported the development of a small number of affordable homes for people from or connected to the parish. Orwell Housing Association (OHA) is now revising its plans based on the needs identified by the survey and will hold a joint 'drop in' consultation event on Monday 9th December between 3.00 and 7.00pm in the Village Hall Foyer to present the scheme to residents and to answer questions. East Suffolk District Council officers will also be present to register residents' interest for the new homes and to explain the application process. OHA will submit their planning application to the District Council following this consultation. Suffolk County Council (SCC) has funds to enhance existing bus services and has invited applications from parishes for new services where demand can be proven and has the potential to be self-financing in the longer term. The Parish Council accordingly ran a survey in the village shop which has shown that there is significant interest in a bus service to Leiston, Saxmundham and Halesworth. The Council will therefore make a submission to the SCC. Residents may still submit interests by sending an email to the Parish Clerk on <u>clerk@westletonparishcouncil.</u> <u>gov.uk.</u>

If the cold weather ahead is a worry for you, please get in touch. We will treat your contact with respect and sensitivity and may be able to help.

#### VILLAGE MATTERS

#### **Parish Council Business**

At October's meeting, it was confirmed that the newly ordered *traffic measures* (mentioned in last month's village newsletter) are scheduled to be completed by Suffolk County Council by January 2025.

As part of the Suffolk Climate Action Team **'Keep the Heat'**, if you'd like your property surveyed (free of charge), please contact the Clerk who'll add you to the list and be in touch once further information is available. Cllrs Roper and Walford will be undertaking the surveys.

The PC is exploring options to improve the **cemetery**. Quotes will be gathered for a survey of suitability for a wildflower garden as well as for the siting of one or two additional benches to support visitors to sit awhile and just be. To develop an earth-kind and green(er) policy, councillors also approved a no-plastic approach and so, from January 2025, new burials will only be permitted biodegradable/ compostable flower and plant arrangements. From June 2025, all plastic/noncompostable/non- biodegradable arrangements are to be removed.

Work has begun to ensure that the Parish Council's **riparian responsibilities** are discharged fully. Liaisons and work have begun with other landowners to ensure that the River Yox is cleared. The wet weather seems to have returned and so it's important that everyone works together to ensure that flood risks are minimised. Householders who live riverside have their part to play by ensuring their surface water drains are clear.

Christmas? It's never too early to talk about **Christmas**...there are plans afoot to gather around the tree, sing and make merry..... More information is coming soon.

The Parish Council is coming to you! From January, Council will trial a threemonthly surgery where **Councillors will be available to meet with residents** on a one-to-one or small-group basis. A schedule is being put together but it's hoped that this will give you the chance to ask your Council for information and/or support on any topic that's important to you. More information next month.
